"WHAT'S NEW" from the Embassy of Japan in Luxembourg

Countries attending a UN conference in New York on rebuilding Haiti following the devastating earthquake in January, have pledged almost \$10 billion in assistance on Wednesday March 31, 2010. Luxembourg has already responded to this disaster, extending emergency assistance though international organizations and NGOs.

Mr. Katsuya Okada, Minister for Foreign Affairs of Japan announced at the meeting that Japan will contribute 30 million dollars in addition to the 70 million dollars already announced. Japan is also deploying its Self-Defense Forces to serve in the United Nations Stabilization Mission in Haiti (MINUSTAH).
